BUYS EDUCATION.....

You already know that 17 cents will buy a pencil, some candy, and erasers. But did you know that 17 cents is all that it takes to keep you in school? It is true. For an average family owning a \$50,000 home it would cost them only 17 cents a day to purchase quality education. The need for this 17 cents a day is due to few financial circumstances affecting the state's budget.

At recent school board meeting School Superintendent Dr. Benny Gooden announced that Govenor Bill Clinton plans to cut the state budget by about \$50 million. This will amount to about a \$25 million state school fund cut, drastically affecting next year's school functions. This is an extremely large cut compared to the \$700,000 previously cut.

What all this means is that many staff personnel may lose their jobs, unemploying many people and cutting family budgets. Besides shifts in staff, what would school be like without sports, music, exploration, or "office" classes if personnel to teach these classes can't be replaced due to a freeze on hiring? Although, these classes may be cut anyway just to save money.

What are some possible solutions? First: We could raise taxes. In March of this ear the millage will once again be presented for public vote. This would solve some of the school's immediate and future problems in the year 1988-89. But it also has its pros and cons. Why would elderly and single adults want to pay other's way through school? But if you look at it from a different angle, what will we the leaders of tomorrow, be like if we aren't educated properly? The future of of our world is in our hands, and if we aren't properly prepared, we may not be able to solve tomorrow's problems.

Second: We could cut all classes except the basic subjects. This might work, although school wouldn't be the same without cheerleaders, a football team, and a band playing. If we decided to cut the extra classes, the school day would be either shorter or we could go the same length as now and the year would be shorter. But again, teachers and staff

members would lose their jobs and

Third: We could combine classes. This would cost some teachers their jobs and put more pressure on the remaining teachers. Classes would be larger, and there would be less individual attention so grades would probably fall. This could lead to a rise in discipline problems.

MOVIE REVIEWS: STAR TREK IV by Jennifer Threadgill




Before the show began organizing, the two ninth grade speech classes elected show organizers. The students are as follows: ninth show. The

How to Succeed on Tests

As you eighth graders
may well know, the Minimum
Performance Test is coming up next
month, but did you know you have to
get an 85% or better on the Minimium
Performance Test to pass to the
ninth grade? The following hints may
help you score higher on tests.

You should always make the best
of your time on a test. If the test is
timed, don't rush but don't dally
either. Answer the easy questions
first. If you're stumped by a
question, go on with the test and
and come back to it later. Make a
note on scratch paper of the
questions you want to go back to so
you can find them easily. If you
finish early, check over your
answers.

You should make as few mistakes

finish early, check over your answers.
You should make as few mistakes as possible. Read all the directions carefully. Understand what you're supposed to do. Ask the person giving the test for help if you don't understand the directions. Read the questions carefully and all the answer choices. Be sure the question number on the test is the same as the one on your answer sheet.
Guessing is a very important part of test taking. You should not guess at every question, only the ones you do not know. Try to eliminate some of the answer choices as wrong. This increases your chances of guessing the correct answer. Don't make wild guesses. Your choice should at least be reasonable.

You should also get ready for the test mentally. You should get plenty of sleep the night before the test. Don't take a test hungry. Be on time and alert. When you take the test, you should put everything else out of your mind and think only of doing your best. Bress comfortably. If you wear glasses, be sure you have them and wear them!

When taking the test, don't panic! Tackle each question one at a time rather than thinking about the whole test at once.

Some questions answer other questions. Look for this.

Don't score yourself as you take the test. This may make worry and slow you down. Trust your first answer but change an answer if you feel you must.

American Mathematics

A study of schools in eighteen nations concludes that American math students trail those who live in Japan and Hong Kong in their mathematical ability. The study stated that American mathematics students were underachieving, which could be creating a future nation of underachievers

William Bennett, U.S. Education Secretary, has suggested that the U.S. use ideas from the Japanese, one of which states that anyone who tries hard enough can accomplish greater progress than they had previously.

Most of the blame for this "lack of knowledge" is being put on U.S. schools that are said to lack focus, challenge, and vitality, and to those schools who repeat the same concepts year after year and neglect to build or add to them each year.

The average time spent in mathematical instruction in the U.S. is 144 hours. Japan's students spend only 101 hours. This disputes claims that American students have a lack of sufficient time for instruction compared to some other nations.
