According to a number of student comments, the show was fantastic and its participants did a wonderful job.



Earl Green- "I'm glad that so many of my friends will be going to Northside with me."



A friend told me that I'd either come away mad or depressed. I was mad. I don't want a reputation as a child beater or a town burner.


I would recommend this movie for anyone who is interested in going into the service. Congratulations to those of you who were able to grasp the meaning in this movie.


